***What You Can Do About Hungry Children This Summer***

**HELP REDUCE SUMMER HUNGER FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH**

Although 21 million children depend on nutritious free and reduced-price meals at school for 9 months out of the year, just a fraction of them receive the free meals provided by the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) during the summer months. This means that about 9 out of 10 kids who could benefit from free meals are at risk for going hungry during the summer months.

We know that hunger is one of the most severe roadblocks to the learning process during the school year, but lack of nutrition during the summer months may also set up a cycle for poor performance once school begins again. Hunger may make children more prone to illness and other health issues. Furthermore, if children are engaged in energetic exercise in summer programs, they become exhausted quickly. This erodes the value of those summer programs, and leads to unnecessary discouragement for the children.

Want to help end hunger this summer? Here are a few ways you can help:

***Find Meals for Children***

Each summer, the Office of Education Child Nutrition Program provides information to the information site, 2-1-1, so that you will be able to call them by June 1 to find detailed information and locations that provide free meals to children and youth during the summer. About that time, you can also visit the Child Nutrition Program website for that information, <http://schools.utah.gov/cnp/Summer-Food-Service-Program/Map.aspx> .

***Become a Sponsor***

Your organization may be able to partner to see that children get the summer nutrition they need.

SFSP sponsors receive payments for serving healthy meals to children and teenagers, 18 years and younger, at approved sites in low-income areas. Schools and nonprofit organizations may apply to sponsor the program. Sponsors receive payments from USDA, through the State Office of Education Child Nutrition Programs, based on the number of meals they serve. All meals are served free to children in approved areas.

Your state education department (contact information below) can tell you if your organization is in a qualified area and how to apply. All sponsors receive training before starting the program to learn how to plan, operate, and monitor a successful food service program.

***Open a Feeding Site***

The Summer Food Service Program reaches only a fraction of the children in need. One reason for limited access to the program is that there are not enough feeding sites. Your organization's buildings might become feeding sites, especially if you are already hosting summer activity programs for children and youth. Sites are the physical locations where food is served. Each site location must work with a Summer Food Service Program Sponsor that is financially and administratively responsible for the meal service at the site. You can also help by coordinating site participation with other child and youth activity programs in your area.

### **Volunteer**

While feeding children is the top priority of the Summer Food Service Program, programming is what keeps children coming back. Serving food and running programs takes volunteers—and LOTS of them—especially in June, July and August. Volunteers can help with basics like transporting food, setting up or cleaning up a site. They also plan and direct educational or recreational activities with the children.

### **Share**

Tell others how the Summer Food Service Program helps feed hungry children and discuss how they or their organization can help. The more people know about the issues, the more likely they are to take action to help end hunger or know how to help their own children.

#### **MORE FAMILIES PLEDGE TO GIVE MORE**

The [Giving Pledge](#) has announced that four more families and individuals have signed on to the campaign and pledged to commit at least half their wealth to philanthropy, bringing the total number of Giving Pledge signatories to a hundred and twenty-seven.

Now in its fourth year, the Giving Pledge includes signatories ranging in age from 29 to 98 and representing twelve countries and twenty-six U.S. states and the District of Columbia. The latest additions were announced at the Giving Pledge annual gathering in Santa Barbara, California, where the world's wealthiest families discussed such topics as partnering with government to maximize impact, investing in women and girls, social entrepreneurship, global health, environment, and education.

#### **KEEPING PEOPLE AND PETS TOGETHER IN TIMES OF CRISIS**

Letters of interest (LOIs) are invited from national organizations that provide direct services to ailing children and adults, veterans, the frail elderly, and women and children fleeing domestic violence who risk losing their pets because no one is there to help them....

Amie's Place Foundation is a New York City-based nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization which is opening grant opportunities nationally. The Foundation hopes to see these model programs replicated around the nation to prevent the unnecessary separation of people and pets that need each other.

Organizations should mail an LOI prior to submitting an application to: Amie's Place Foundation - Church Street Station - PO Box 1799 - New York, New York 10008. LOIs must include most recent IRS tax-exempt status letter and brief history and goals of the applicant organization; description of the program to be funded and the organization's involvement with the issues it seeks to address; a summary of activities for which the organization requests support; an outline of the organization's objectives, anticipated outcomes and implications. Please include the approximate starting date of the program, the duration that the funding will cover, amount of funding needed, other sources of support, and current contact information of the person responsible for communicating with the Foundation. Following Amie's Place Foundation Board review, qualified organizations will be invited to submit a complete application package.

### **Arts, Culture and the Humanities**

#### **STUDY IN ROME**

A program of the American Academy in Rome, the Rome Prize is awarded to thirty North American emerging artists and scholars in the early or middle stages of their careers who exemplify the highest standard of excellence in arts and humanities scholarship.

Fellows are chosen from the disciplines of architecture, design, historic preservation and conservation, landscape architecture, literature, musical composition, visual arts, ancient studies, Medieval studies, Renaissance and Early Modern studies, and Modern Italian studies.

Each Rome Prize winner is provided with a stipend, meals, a bedroom with private bath, and a study or studio. (Those with children under the age of 18 live in partially subsidized apartments nearby.) Winners of six-month and eleven-month fellowships receive stipends of \$16,000 and \$28,000, respectively.

## **EMERGING ARTISTS**

The Chicago-based Harpo Foundation supports under-recognized artists. The foundation seeks to stimulate creative inquiry and encourage new modes of thinking about art. One emerging artist will receive a one-month residency at the Santa Fe Art Institute, which includes a well-appointed room with private bath, well-lit studio space, and a \$500 travel stipend.

## **MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS / K-12**

Through its Keeping Music Alive program, the foundation will donate musical instruments to school music programs that serve low-income communities and have little or no budget for instruments. Public, private, and charter schools may apply, but schools must be Title 1 and/or serve a population where at least 50 percent of the kids qualify for the [National Lunch Program](#). In addition, schools must have an established instrumental music program (concert band, marching band, jazz band, and/or orchestra) that takes place during the regular school day and is at least three years old.

## **MUSIC EDUCATION**

The Mockingbird Foundation offers competitive grants to schools and nonprofit organizations to support music education for children. Many apply for these grants, so only about 1% of applicants are funded, but the two-tiered application is straightforward and relatively easy to submit, so it may still be worth the effort. ## **DIGITAL PROJECTS FOR THE PUBLIC / NATIONAL ENDOWMENT for the HUMANITIES**

The Digital Projects for the Public program supports projects such as websites, mobile applications, games, and virtual environments that significantly contribute to the public's engagement with humanities ideas. Projects must be analytical and deeply grounded in humanities scholarship in a discipline such as history, religion, anthropology, jurisprudence, or art history. Digital Projects for the Public grants support projects that are largely created for digital platforms. While these projects can take many forms, shapes, and sizes, you should apply to this program primarily to create digital projects or the digital components of a larger project. NEH is a national funding agency, so these projects should demonstrate the potential to attract a broad, general audience. Projects can have

specific targeted audiences (including K-12 students), but they should also strive to cultivate a more inclusive audience.

This round of grants has a total of \$100,000 nationwide.

### **ENTREPRENEURS WITH EFFICIENCIES FOR COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTERS**

Grants of up to \$1.5 million will be awarded to companies with technology- or service-based solutions that enable community health centers and clinics to stretch their resources, increase patient access to care, and/or lower the cost of providing care. To be eligible, companies must be based in the United States and demonstrate how their product or service can maintain or improve patient experience while enhancing health center efficiency by at least 20 percent, provide access to highly needed health service(s) for a hundred thousand patients annually, and/or reduce costs by \$25 million annually.

## **RURAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

The Rural Business-Cooperative Service announces the availability of \$3,000,000, in competitive grant funds for the FY 2014 Small Socially-Disadvantaged Producer Grants (SSDPG) program.

The primary objective of the SSDPG program is to provide technical assistance to small, socially-disadvantaged agricultural producers through eligible cooperatives and cooperative development centers. Grants are awarded on a competitive basis. Grants may be made to Cooperatives, Groups of Cooperatives, and Cooperative Development Centers where a majority of the board of directors or governing board is comprised of individuals who are members of Socially-Disadvantaged Groups. You must be able to verify your legal structure in the State in which you are incorporated. Grants may not be made to public bodies or to individuals.

Awards will be made for up to \$200,000, with total funds of \$3,000,000.

### QUICK HEALTH DATA ONLINE: ONLINE TRAINING

The US Department of Health and Human Services, Office on Women's Health is sponsoring a free, two-part online training for the new Quick Health Data Online. This will greatly facilitate the use of the new resource, so that you can quickly and easily access data needed for a competitive grant application or for needs assessments.

The Quick Health Data Online system contains data on demographics, mortality, reproductive and maternal health, disease incidence, and access to care at the county level for all states and territories; additionally, data are included on prevention, violence, and mental health at the state level. To the extent possible, data are provided by race, ethnicity and gender, and where applicable/available, by age. Also, the system incorporates graphing and mapping features so that the data of interest can be used directly as tables, graphs/chart and maps.

There are two trainings per month. The basic training will provide an overview of the system and the focus on mapping/second training will provide an emphasis on mapping techniques. The trainings are repeated on various days to allow anyone who wishes to participate an opportunity to do so.
