# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Homelessness is a complex social and humanitarian issue. While the realities of potentially becoming homeless are unique to each individual, systematic, economic, health and societal influences contribute to the rate of homelessness in Utah. In this reporting period, the COVID-19 pandemic added an unprecedented public health challenge that significantly impacted homelessness. The pandemic posed unique risks for people experiencing homelessness, with limited access to preventative measures, such as handwashing, home isolation, avoiding high touch surfaces, and rapid access to health care<sup>1</sup>. The pandemic also limited individuals in securing other safe temporary options outside of emergency shelters, such as with family and friends. Together with the lack of deeply affordable and attainable housing, stagnant wages, temporarily decreased employment options, job loss and reduction in household incomes, more Utahns have been at risk of becoming homeless.

Our social service networks have endured significant modifications, increased costs and limitations to services offered during this reporting period. While the overall number of Utahns experiencing homelessness increased in the 2021 Pandemic Point-in-Time Count, the number of people recorded in the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) as accessing services over the federal fiscal year 2020 (FFY20) decreased, continuing a trend we've seen for the past four years. The Pandemic Point-in-Time Count was conducted using different methods than regular point-in-time counts in previous years due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and therefore cannot be directly compared to other years.

The Office of Homeless Services strives to work together with communities throughout Utah to make homelessness in Utah **rare**, **brief and non-recurring** by providing statewide support of project services and interventions.

The <u>State of Utah Strategic Plan on Homelessness</u> established statewide goals and benchmarks on which to measure progress. In order to measure progress towards ensuring homelessness in Utah is rare, brief and non-recurring, Utah aligns performance with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) established System Performance Measures (SPM).

## **MAKING HOMELESSNESS RARE**

Federal Fiscal Year 2020 goal: Reduce the number of individuals experiencing homelessness

Utah has realized a four-year downward trend in the number of individuals experiencing homelessness for the first time. In FFY20, 7,433 people experienced homelessness for the first time compared to 9,493 people in FFY17, which represents a 21.7 percent decrease.

## **MAKING HOMELESSNESS BRIEF**

Federal Fiscal Year 2020 goal: Decrease stay in shelter to 50 days or less

HUD has identified a high-performing community standard that calls for 1) the average length of time homeless to be fewer than 20 days or 2) to reduce the average length of time by at least 10 percent from the preceding fiscal year. In FFY19, the average length of time spent in emergency shelters for people experiencing homelessness in Utah was 55 days. Our goal for FFY20 was to achieve an average of 50 days. However, the length of stay in emergency shelters increased in FFY20 to an average of 66 days.

## MAKING HOMELESSNESS NON-RECURRING

Federal Fiscal Year 2020 goal: 93 percent of individuals in the homeless services system retain housing

The system is highly effective in keeping the most vulnerable in housing. In FFY20, 95 percent of individuals enrolled in permanent housing projects, other than rapid rehousing, either exited to or retained their permanent housing. This is an improvement from 93 percent reported in FFY19.

Federal Fiscal Year 2020's goal: To limit the number of people returning to homelessness to 29 percent


The rate at which individuals return to homelessness has also been decreasing for the last four years. In FFY20 we met our goal to reduce this number from 32 percent to 29 percent.

## STATE ESG CARES ACT FUNDING

The Federal Government provided the Emergency Solutions Grant - Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security (ESG CARES) Act funding to prevent, prepare for and respond to COVID-19 among individuals and families experiencing homelessness or who are receiving homeless assistance. The funding supported additional homeless assistance and homelessness prevention activities to mitigate the impacts created by COVID-19. The state of Utah ESG CARES allocation contributed just over \$14 million to this effort. From June 2020 to March 2021, ESG CARES Act funding expanded services by funding 66 projects across 30 agencies, supporting 7,563 individuals through Homelessness Prevention, Rapid Re-housing, Emergency Shelter and Street Outreach programs.

- Homelessness Prevention programs helped 160 people
- Rapid Re-housing assisted 436 people
- Emergency Shelters served 6,392 people
- Street Outreach supported 1,130 people

Homelessness

The state of Utah is divided into three Continua of Care (CoC) and 13 Local Homeless Councils (LHC). The CoCs and LHCs are regional and local planning bodies that are responsible for aligning funding, promoting data quality, and coordinating housing and homeless services for families and individuals experiencing homelessness.

The CoCs are entities designated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to:


- Promote a community-wide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness;
- Provide funding for efforts by nonprofit providers and state and local governments to quickly rehouse homeless individuals and families while minimizing the trauma and dislocation caused to homeless individuals, families and communities;
- Promote the utilization of mainstream programs and benefits; and
- Utilize data to redirect services, funding and resources as necessary.

The LHCs are counties or groups of counties designated by the Utah Homeless Network and are the designated local oversight bodies that are responsible for:

- Developing a common agenda and vision for reducing homelessness in their respective regions;
- Developing a spending plan that coordinates the funding supplied to local stakeholders;
- Aligning local funding to projects that improve outcomes and target specific needs in the community.

The Utah Homeless Network was established by the Utah Strategic Plan on Homelessness in 2019. The UHN's role is to:

- Support connections across the LHCs, CoCs and state and local governments;
- Share best practices;
- Understand changing trends in homeless populations;
- Build a social network of professional support; and
- Make policy recommendations to the Utah Homeless Council.



# DATA INCLUDED IN THIS REPORT

The Utah Annual Report on Homelessness includes several data types from different sources, including the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2020 (October 1, 2019 to September 30, 2020) System Performance Measures (SPM), 2021 Housing Inventory Count (HIC), and the 2021 Pandemic Point-in-Time count (PIT). These reports can provide a more well-rounded picture of this complex issue when reviewed together. The following sections present data for each of the following reports at the State, CoC, LHC and county levels. The System Performance Measure data is only available at the State, CoC, and LHC levels.

NOTE: "No data to report" or N/A is used in the report to indicate one of the following:

- The specific measure did not contain any data due to a lack of applicable projects in the area.
- All results for the area or measure were "0."

## SYSTEM PERFORMANCE MEASURES

For many years, HUD has reviewed the impact of its funds on reducing homelessness on a program-by-program basis. As a result, it has been difficult to gain an accurate and comprehensive community-level understanding of the performance of the homelessness services system. HUD has developed the System Performance Measures (SPM) report to address this need and comply with the federal Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing (HEARTH) Act. Data is managed in the Utah Homeless Management Information System (UHMIS). The SPM helps communities more accurately evaluate their impacts, successes and challenges to inform strategic decisions in the development of the homeless system. Some providers do not enter data into UHMIS, either by a mandate (i.e., Domestic Violence Service Providers) or by choice. As a result, SPM data does not always reflect all projects and services that occur.

The SPM is also used in the State of Utah Strategic Plan on Homelessness to help the state and LHCs understand trends and shift priorities to make homelessness rare, brief and nonrecurring. The graphic on page 10 shows the HUD system performance measures that have been identified as particularly significant in considering homeless services in Utah. This report covers the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) of October 1 to September 30 and includes SPM data at the state, CoC, and LHC levels.

Use of the System Performance Measures:

- The SPM report is meant to be utilized by the CoC as a whole, not by individual projects, organizations
  or LHCs. Therefore, generating the SPM report by a smaller subset than a CoC can cause errors,
  resulting in no information or 'N/A' to be displayed for a field. Missing data often occurs in the LHC
  sections of the report because LHCs simply do not have relevant data within the area.
- To improve data quality, HUD allows homeless service providers to back-date or change data entered into HMIS. Backdating may cause the information to change for a given time after it has initially been

- reported. The FFY19 data presented in this report for Utah and the Salt Lake County CoC have been updated from the 2020 annual report to reflect the updated data submitted to HUD.
- The Strategic Plan has highlighted the need to look more closely at data by LHC to strengthen local response efforts.



## **MEASURE 1: LENGTH OF TIME (LOT) PERSONS REMAIN HOMELESS**

This measure looks at all Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing projects and finds the average number of days that a person was homeless in sheltered homelessness during the reporting period.



# MEASURE 2: THE EXTENT TO WHICH PERSONS WHO EXIT HOMELESSNESS TO PERMANENT HOUSING DESTINATIONS RETURN TO HOMELESSNESS

This measure evaluates how many people exited homelessness to permanent housing 24 months before the reporting period, then calculates how many returned to homelessness at different intervals.



## **MEASURE 3: NUMBER OF HOMELESS PERSONS**

This measure represents an unduplicated count of people in Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing projects during the reporting period.



# MEASURE 4: EMPLOYMENT AND INCOME GROWTH FOR HOMELESS PERSONS IN COC PROGRAM-FUNDED PROJECTS

This measure shows the percentage of people only in CoC-federally funded programs who increased income during the reporting period.

- SPM 4 divides its results into 'Stayers' and 'Leavers.' Stayers are people not exited from the project during the reporting period and have been in the project for at least 365 days. Leavers are people who have exited the project.
- CoC programs are programs funded through the CoC competition with HUD.

## MEASURE 5: NUMBER OF PERSONS WHO BECOME HOMELESS FOR THE FIRST TIME

This measure includes all Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, and Permanent Housing projects' enrollment start dates during the reporting period. The measure then looks back 24 months to see if

the individual experiencing homelessness was in another Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, and Permanent Housing project during that time. If they were not, they are considered first-time homeless.



#### **MEASURE 6: HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION AND HOUSING PLACEMENT OF PERSONS**



# **2021 HOUSING INVENTORY COUNT (HIC)**

On January 27, 2021, each of Utah's Continua of Care carried out the HUD-mandated Housing Inventory Count (HIC). The Housing Inventory Count compares the number of individuals and families spending the night in various homeless services programs to the number of beds available in those programs on a specific night. It also reports the number of these beds dedicated to specific subpopulations, including veterans, survivors of domestic violence, individuals with HIV or AIDS, and youth. The HIC enables communities to generate a snapshot of their homeless service system's capacity and the extent to which those resources are being utilized.

The count includes the number of beds and units available on the night of the Point-in-Time Count, including domestic violence service providers, in these types of programs:

- Emergency Shelter
- Transitional Housing
- Permanent Supportive Housing
- Rapid Re-housing
- Other Permanent Housing



In 2021, there were more emergency shelter beds available, and more individuals staying in permanent housing this year than in the past. Throughout the state, Permanent Housing projects were at or near full capacity. # PANDEMIC POINT-IN-TIME COUNT (PIT)

On January 27, 2021, each of Utah's Continua of Care carried out the HUD-mandated Point-in-Time Count (PIT). The PIT is a massive effort that takes place throughout the U.S. to count everyone who meets the HUD definition of literal homelessness in a geographic area on a single night. Literal homelessness is defined as staying in an Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, or a place not meant for human habitation (such as in a vehicle or a city park). Many factors influence the results of any given PIT, including weather, volunteer effort, CoC organization, and planning. Regardless, the PIT is a valuable tool in calculating a community's need for homeless services on any given night. It is also one of the only tools available for measuring the number of homeless individuals who are not enrolled in homeless service programs.

The COVID-19 pandemic posed a significant challenge to conducting the annual PIT unsheltered count. While the January 2021 Pandemic PIT count fulfilled the HUD requirement for an annual count and employed some of the same techniques as the counts in previous years, methodologies for the

unsheltered portion of the count were modified significantly in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. With approval from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), the Continua of Care in Utah did not collect any demographic or subpopulation data during this year's unsheltered count. Instead, they simply reported the total number of individuals experiencing unsheltered homelessness on the night of the count to reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission. In the Balance of State and Mountainland CoCs, the unsheltered count was determined through the use of short surveys administered in the two weeks immediately following the night of the count through limited canvassing efforts and at the locations of other services being accessed by those experiencing unsheltered homelessness. These surveys were conducted in accordance with all necessary COVID-19 safety precautions in order to protect all involved.

Due to higher case counts in Salt Lake County and recommendations from local health experts, The Salt Lake Valley Coalition to End Homelessness further reduced interaction between volunteers and those experiencing homelessness by having outreach teams and volunteers report those they observed experiencing homelessness in randomly selected census tracts on the morning of Jan. 28 rather than completing a survey. These random samples were then extrapolated across other tracts anticipated to have similar unsheltered homeless populations to calculate the overall unsheltered count.

While these modifications were necessary for the safety of all involved, they potentially impacted the results of the unsheltered counts across the state. # AS A RESULT OF THESE METHODOLOGICAL DIFFERENCES, THE 2021 UNSHELTERED AND TOTAL COUNTS CANNOT BE COMPARED TO PREVIOUS YEARS' UNSHELTERED AND TOTAL COUNTS IN THE DETAILED WAYS PIT COUNTS HAVE BEEN COMPARED IN THE PAST.

The 2021 Pandemic PIT count showed 3,565 Utahns were experiencing homelessness on a single night. Through careful planning and the implementation of safety protocols and additional noncongregate shelter options, the homeless service system was able to provide shelter to roughly the same number of people on a single night as they were pre-pandemic. While it is important to acknowledge that the Pandemic PIT count increased throughout the state, especially among those experiencing unsheltered homelessness, it is difficult to establish a precise measurement of the increase due to methodological differences between the 2021 Pandemic PIT count and previous PIT counts necessitated by COVID-19.






## **MEASURE 1: LENGTH OF TIME (LOT) PERSONS REMAIN HOMELESS**









This measure counts the number of people experiencing homelessness for the first time in the reporting period, including people entering emergency shelters, transitional housing, and all permanent housing projects.









This measure represents an unduplicated count of people enrolled in Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing projects during the reporting period.












