Nope. We try to report as accurately as humanly possible, but can't be responsible for things like information on other websites, and changes, discrepancies, etc. Read the disclaimer at the end of this letter. The object is to save you time on first-sweep research so that you have more time to do good things, and also to assist you in accessing funding for good works.

What is included in the letter?

It's all based on what not-for-profits say they need. Basically, we are hearing that it is hard for each organization to devote much manpower to writing grants, let alone finding potential grants and researching background information needed to win them. We also hear that not all of you have big bucks for training, but are interested in high quality experiences for little or no registration fees. Tips and news were also requested.

A. TIPS *(Timely tips, and sometimes mini-lessons)*

BULLYING

As summer ends, more than school is starting for children and youth—there are a myriad of after-school, extra-curricular and weekend programs for children and youth. Schools are gearing up to prevent and address bullying problems, but they are not the only organizations who will see bullies and their aftermath.

Bullying is the use of force or coercion to abuse or intimidate others. When you think about it, children and youth see models of bullying everywhere in our society, and there is often confusion about its acceptability, and confusion about what really constitutes bullying.

We are beginning to know more about bullying because of a new focus on research on the topic. Some references into the latest information are made below. The research is reinforcing some basics, even as it leads us to new understandings of causes and real effects.

1. You have to declare a no-bully zone before the program or event starts, and keep on declaring it. Try posters everywhere, starting with information fairs and registration times.
2. You have to define what you mean by bullying—clearly and in detail.
3. You need to do your homework first, so that you have the tools to implement best practices for your situation.
4. You need to enlist and train staff, volunteers, and parents and guardians to work together. Bullying is not good for anyone. New research is showing the extent of damage that can occur for those bullied, but is also showing serious negative social and psychological effects for bullies.
5. You need a plan for stopping bullying without taking away anyone's dignity.
6. You need to be consistent and continual in implementing your plan.

WHAT CAN BE LEARNED FROM SCHOOL SURVEYS?

A growing number of cities and states are using surveys to collect vital information about school, including the learning environment/school climate. The New York City Department of Education's (DOE) annual survey of parents, students, and teachers is the largest of its kind in the United States. The Research Alliance for New York City Schools has produced a report that gives an analysis of this survey which presents a set of broader lessons that have emerged, and which may provide guidance to others that are implementing school survey efforts.

INSTEAD OF CASH, TOYOTA DONATES EFFICIENCY

Does your organization rely heavily on grants and donations? This report in the New York Times (and picked up by the Foundation Center) offers another look at what might be most useful from benefactors. It comes at a time when some of the biggest foundations are no longer offering cash, but are using various means to convey what they consider to be more valuable, and a way to benefit more agencies, by making information accessible not just as reported in this article, but on their websites, in webinars, and in other creative ways.

Although the offer of *kaizen*, or "continuous improvement," instead of cash from Toyota initially was met with apprehension at the Food Bank for NYC, the efficiencies the company has built into the charity's operations have been transformative.

TARGETED SPAY/NEUTER PROGRAMS

Grants of up to \$100,000 a year for up to two years will be awarded to nonprofits, government agencies, and educational institutions for spay/neuter programs targeting owned pet and free-roaming cat populations in specific geographic areas where there is a critical need. Target areas may include all or part of a county, city, township, ZIP code, census tract, neighborhood, mobile home park, or other location. Applications will be accepted beginning on July 15, 2013, but information is already posted at the site listed below.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE / PETS

Letters of Interest (LOIs) are invited from national organizations that provide direct services to ailing children and adults, veterans, the frail elderly, and women and children fleeing domestic violence who risk losing their pets because no one is there to help them.

LOIs must include most recent IRS tax-exempt status letter and brief history and goals of the applicant organization; description of the program to be funded and the organization's involvement

with the issues it seeks to address; a summary of activities for which the organization requests support; an outline of the organization's objectives, anticipated outcomes and implications. Please include the approximate starting date of the program, the duration that the funding will cover, amount of funding needed, other sources of support, and current contact information of the person responsible for communicating with the Foundation. Following Amie's Place Foundation Board review, qualified organizations will be invited to submit a complete application package.

MUSIC EDUCATION

The [Mockingbird Foundation, Inc.](#) offers competitive grants to schools and nonprofit organizations to support music education for children. Especially recently, many apply for these grants, so only about 1% of applicants are funded, but the application is straightforward and relatively easy to submit, so it may still be worth the effort. They have completed review of proposals for their 15th round of competitive grants, and are now accepting [inquiries](#). **Submission of initial inquiries occurs via an online form which opens by January and is due by August 1st 2013. MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS

The [Mr. Holland's Opus Foundation](#) donates both new and refurbished instruments to school and after-school music programs in the United States that lack the resources to keep up with equipment loss due to attrition, depreciation, and wear over time, and to accommodate students on waiting lists or who have to share instruments.

The foundation funds instrument repair and the acquisition of new instruments. It does not provide cash grants. Priority is given to music programs serving low-income communities, programs with little or no budget for musical instruments, and music programs that serve the most students out of the school population.

Applications are made available by invitation only. Potential applicants must first submit an online pre-qualification form to be considered for an invitation. Pre-qualification forms will be available at the foundation's Web site until **August 1, 2013**.

USDA BUSINESS PROCESS IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

The Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) is informing partners of the opportunity to submit grant applications for the FY2013 Process and Technology Improvement Grants. This year, USDA is interested in funding projects that examine office processes *and* identify and implement efficiencies.

These projects can include partnerships with vendors or contractors on business process re-engineering (BPR) techniques or train-the-trainer programs to achieve efficiencies. The Department is also interested in funding projects that use technology to achieve procedural changes that simplify administration of the SNAP or projects that lead to greater efficiencies and improved outcomes of E&T programs. All 53 State agencies that administer SNAP, State or local governments, agencies providing health or welfare services, public health or educational entities and private nonprofit entities such as community-based or faith-based organizations, food banks, or other emergency feeding organizations may apply. The Public Welfare Foundation has a **two-step application process** that includes both a **letter of inquiry (LOI)** and a **full proposal**. They accept inquiries throughout the year; it generally takes four to six months to process a successful grant application. Proposal Deadlines are every 45 days.

The goal is to ensure that low-income children receive nutritious food during critical times when they are out of school and particularly vulnerable to hunger.

Average Grant Size: \$5,000 - \$10,000 Typically they call for proposals two times per year. Once in the spring, for funding for summer meals programs, and once in the early summer for all of our other program priorities. They accept letters of inquiry at any time, and will notify any eligible organizations of the next available grant opportunity. Letters of Inquiry are accepted year round. CHILDREN AND YOUTH / MILK

The Special Milk Program provides milk to children in schools, child care institutions and eligible camps that do not participate in other Federal child nutrition meal service programs. The program reimburses schools and institutions for the milk they serve. That rate is usually less than the cost of the milk, but it helps.

To the extent possible, data are provided by race, ethnicity and gender, and where applicable/available, by age. Also, the system incorporates graphing and mapping features so that the data of interest can be used directly as tables, graphs/chart and maps.

This data will be useful to grantwriters looking for supporting data when applying for contracts and grants as well as to anyone working in women's healthcare to prepare for implementation of the Affordable Care Act, especially for tracking access to health care and access to preventive services.

Each session of the two-part training will last one hour, and you can be sitting at your desk using your computer. The training cycle will be repeated each month for three months. The first session each month will provide an overview of the system and the second session will emphasize mapping techniques.
