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Health Screenings, TB Tests & Vaccines



Health Screening

All community-sponsored refugee arrivals are eligible to schedule a comprehensive Refugee Domestic Health Screening with one of our refugee health screening clinics. These should happen within 30 to 90 days of their arrival date into the U.S. Below are a list of certified clinics that have received the required training to become a refugee health screening provider:

If your community sponsorship group is located beyond these areas around Utah, we request your support to find a provider willing to do an ad-hoc refugee health screening. We can provide a list of resources, a checklist and more to the provider so they can feel confident to know what to look/screen for during the health screening. Feel free to connect to our team's general inbox with any questions and requests for additional information rhprogram@utah.gov.

Note: When scheduling the appointment, be prepared to provide basic demographic information, Medicaid number (if available; it's okay to let them know you have applied and are waiting on the results), and an AlienID number. This helps our clinics to determine eligibility for the refugee health screening.

 Prior to the health screening, please ensure the client has applied for retroactive Medicaid.


- These screenings include all the required immunizations and blood tests for immigration and state-required testing and reporting in accordance with the <u>CDC Guidance for Domestic Refugee</u> Health Screening.
- When calling to make a health screening appointment, be sure to say you need to schedule a "Refugee Health Screening" for a "Community Sponsored Refugee."
- Be sure to mention interpretation needs for the appointment.
- As a sponsor, the client may receive referrals at the appointment. Please support them in connecting with all follow-up care and specialists identified from the initial screening with an approved Medicaid provider.

Common follow-ups

Tuberculosis (TB)

- All refugees receive a form of TB screening, whether a blood test or chest x-ray, prior to traveling to the U.S.
- At the health screening, the provider will review their chart and determine if additional testing is necessary to rule out latent tuberculosis (LTBI).
- If someone screens positive for LTBI, then the provider will refer the patient for a chest x-ray and then a local health department for further follow-up.
- It's important to ensure clients with these types of TB concerns are referred to the local health department and supported with completing any evaluation and treatment as requested by the nurses.

Immunizations

Most immunizations happen overseas and any remaining are done at the refugee health screening appointment.

If a client is in need of immunizations, these will be provided at the Refugee Domestic Health Screening (as available) or at an area immunization clinic in the Salt Lake Valley. More information may be found here and contact information for other local health departments around Utah's can be found here.

Note: an immunization clinic is located downstairs at the Salt Lake County Health Department building.

FYIs and Contact Information

Again, make sure all refugee arrivals apply for Retroactive Medicaid immediately upon arrival into Utah.

- It's crucial to apply as soon as they arrive in Utah and request backdate approval for Medicaid to their date of arrival into the U.S.

Mental Health Services



Transition to life in the United States is difficult for most refugees, immigrants and parolees. Many will experience distress (e.g. feelings of anxiety and sadness, hopelessness, difficulty sleeping, fatigue, irritability, anger and/or aches and pains). For most people, these reactions will improve over time.

Clinical agencies in Utah that specialize in refugee mental health are the Asian Association of Utah (AAU) and Utah Health and Human Rights (UHHR). The treatment options offered at each agency and may be available in person or virtually. These agencies

are located in Salt Lake City, but can also provide services to clients in other areas of Utah. Please contact each agency for more information based on your individual needs.

Asian Association of Utah (AAU): <u>aau-slc.org</u>

AAU works with clients with adjustment disorders, depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder, severe chronic illness, etc. AAU also provides counseling to survivors and perpetrators of domestic violence. Their clients include refugees, immigrants, parolees, asylum seekers, asylees and survivors of trafficking.

The center offers the following mental health services:

- Outpatient mental health, substance use and domestic violence services
- Qualified clinical support using evidencebased methods
- Interpretation
- Individual and group psychotherapy
- Individualized case management
- Medication management

In addition to mental health services, AAU also provides:

- Social services
- Afterschool support summer school
- Youth mentoring
- Parenting programs
- Housing assistance
- English language learning
- · Human trafficking support

• Utah Health and Human Rights (UHHR): uhhr.org

UHHR is the only organization in Utah to provide co-located and highly-specialized mental health, medical, legal and case management services to refugees and asylum seekers who have been impacted by torture and severe war-related violence and trauma. UHHR provides the following services:

- Individual psychotherapy
- Group psychotherapy and psychoeducation
- In-house psychiatric clinic
- Medical assessment and advocacy
- Case management
- Legal representation for torture survivors seeking asylum
- Interpretation needs
- Transportation needs

To refer a client, please complete the <u>Referral</u> <u>Form</u> and prepare the following information:

- Client's personal information name, age, gender, ethnicity, country of origin, etc.
- Client's contact information address, phone number
- Client's preferred language and interpretation needs
- Details around the client's history and experience with torture or violence



- The Children's Center Utah: Although not solely focused on refugee health, the Children's Center Utah often receives referrals from refugee resettlement agencies and works with families with children ages 0 to 6. The Children's Center provides the following services:
- · Child and family therapy
- · Assessment and evaluation
- · Medication management
- · Trauma treatment
- Therapeutic preschool program

• Additional Support for Mental Health in Utah: NAMI Utah offers free support groups and education for anyone impacted by mental health conditions throughout Utah, including those with mental health conditions and their family members or loved ones. Programs in English and Spanish educate and support participants, helping them realize they are not alone, recovery is possible and treatment works.

- Call 988 (National Suicide Prevention Lifeline): The new three-digit dialing code connects people to compassionate, accessible care. Support is available for anyone experiencing mental health-related distress—whether that is thoughts of suicide, mental health or substance use crisis, or any other kind of emotional distress. People can also dial 988 if they are worried about a loved one who may need crisis support. This dialing code is confidential, no-cost and available 24/7/365 to everyone across the United States.
- Utah Crisis Line University of Utah 1-800-273-8255 (TALK) or 801-587-3000: Callers in Utah that dial 988 will be connected to the Utah Crisis Line and certified crisis workers at the Huntsman Mental Health



Institute. This line is also completely free and confidential.

Mobile Crisis Outreach Teams (MCOT) - University of Utah Crisis Line: For a crisis and issue that requires immediate support, the Utah Crisis Line can send out a mobile crisis outreach team to many areas of the state. These teams provide fast, free and face-to-face or virtual video responses.

A "crisis" can mean something different to every person. These are all examples of things people contact them about when they are in a crisis:

- Stress
- Anxiety
- Depression
- Relationship struggles
- Loss of a loved one
- Thoughts of suicide
- Other words for crisis could include struggle, feeling stuck, feeling anxious or going through a hard time. A crisis is something that can overwhelm you so that you can't solve a problem.

Documentation



Apply for a Social Security Number by submitting form 1-765.

- Refugees arriving through Welcome Corps can apply for federal and state benefits prior to receiving a Social Security number. The individual may be required to show proof that they have applied for a Social Security number.
- 2. Submit form I-765 and save confirmation of submission.
- 3. Form I-765 is also an application for an Employment Authorization Document (EAD) which is used by employers to hire individuals with refugee status.

Public Benefits



Public benefits available to refugees include SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), medicaid, financial, child care and refugee cash assistance. The Refugee Services Office has employment services, connections to community resources and offers assistance to apply for benefits.

- Families with children under 18 can apply for TANF. If approved, they will receive monthly cash assistance based on family size.
- Refugees can apply for SNAP, also known as food stamps. If approved, they will receive monthly food assistance based upon family size.
- Refugees can apply for WIC (Women, Infants and Children), a supplemental nutrition program for pregnant, infants and young children.
- If the refugee does not have children with them, they may be eligible for Refugee Cash Assistance. They may be eligible for up to 12

months of cash assistance from their date of arrival.

School Enrollment & English Learning



All children in the U.S. are entitled to equal access to a public elementary and secondary education, regardless of their or their parents' national origin, citizenship or immigration status.

Enrollment in public schools will be based on where the family is living. Contact the individual school to determine what information is needed to enroll.
