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UTAH'S EMPLOYMENT SUMMARY: OCTOBER 2013

SALT LAKE CITY— Utah's nonfarm payroll employment for October 2013 grew by an estimated 2.2 percent, adding 27,800 jobs to the economy as compared to October 2012. Utah's current count of jobs measures 1,299,000. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for the state registered 4.6 percent; for the United States the rate is 7.3.

Due to the federal government shutdown in October, September employment numbers were not available for the states. Since reopening, those measures were made available: in the month of September Utah added 26,700 jobs (2.1 percent growth year-over) and experienced an unemployment rate of 4.7 percent.

Autumn appears to be a time of economic leveling-off for the state, as the unemployment rate remains virtually unchanged and the job growth rate tapers off. Despite this, labor force participation continues to increase across the state.

All of the eleven private sector industries posted net job increases in October as compared to last year. The largest increases were in Trade, Transportation and Utilities (7,600 jobs), Leisure and Hospitality (5,800 jobs) and Education and Health (5,600 jobs). Government employment contracted by 8,000 jobs in the same period.






## Year-Over Percent Change In Nonfarm Jobs
